1. (Agriculture.) ROBERTS, Job. *The Pennsylvania Farmer; being a selection from the most approved treatises on husbandry, interspersed with observations and experiments*. 
First edition. A nice copy of this appealing compendium, partly from the writings of Middle Atlantic farmers John Spurrier, John Beale Bordley and others, and partly from reports of the Connecticut Society for Promoting Agriculture, combined with Roberts' own observations. In addition to the usual treatments of soils, improvements, wheat, Indian corn, livestock, etc., there are recipes for birch and currant wine, and a number of pages on cider making. 2. (Agriculture - Massachusetts.) Rules and Regulations of the Massachusetts Society for Promoting Agriculture: Containing the names of its officers, several important communications, and interesting extracts, from foreign and domestic publications, with a list of premiums, donations, &c. By the Trustees. Boston: Printed by Thomas Fleet, 1796. 8vo, stitched. Pp. 78, final blank; uncut; engraved plate. Moderate soiling and stains, a very good copy in original state. \$325.00

The Society's second publication, the first to contain original contributions, including William Dandridge Peck's "Natural History of the Canker Worm," with a plate, later published separately, and others on compost, cheese making, and wheat. Six pages are given to "Directions how to make Sugar from Maple Juice or Sap," an early contribution to the subject. A nice copy, with the signature of Enoch Perley, a contributor. First edition thus, illustrated with some of Anderson's strongest and most fanciful work. In a lovely rose and tan streaked Spanish leather binding. Hamilton 242.

5. [BRADFORD, Ebeneezer]. Mr. Thomas Paine's Trial; Being an Examination of His Age of Reason. To which is added, Two addresses, the first to the Deists, and the second to the Youths of America. With some brief remarks on Gilbert Wakefield's examination of said Age of Reason. Dedicated to George Washington, President of the United States of America. Boston: Isaiah Thomas and Ebenezer T. First edition. Bradford was a Massachusetts clergyman, and vocal anti-Federalist. He is best remembered as the author of *The Art of Courting*, a seminal American novel. The present work is Bradford's longest tract. He "attacked Deism by employing both vituperative broadsides and appeals to traditional Calvinistic theology. Bradford's was an important, if not major, part of the religious and political debates of the late eighteenth century." - Randall Craig, in *American Writers before 1800*, p. 184. Scarce. First American edition. First published in London in 1776, this is the most comprehensive work on the subject to be published in America up to the time. Nearly half of the text is given to a translation of Berberet's "Mémoire sur les Maladies épidémique des Bestiaux." Rink 1589; Evans 29083.

7. CHATEAUBRIAND, Francois A. *Atala; or the Love and Constancy of Two Savages in the Desert. First American edition and first edition in English. Chateaubriand's first novel, a picturesque and sympathetic tale of Cherokee life in the 18th century, is a cornerstone of European Romanticism and in Bingham's translation exerted an influence on subsequent American frontier literature, going through at least five editions by the 1840s. The novel was written during the author's visit to America in 1791, and first published in 1801. In this copy, two phrases are cancelled in ink, both potent descriptions of physical violence, perhaps too strong for an early reader. Sabin 122240; Imprints 2015.

First American edition. Edward Dubois (1774 - 1850) was an English wit and man of letters, according to the DNB. This work was a satire on J. Carr's *The Stranger in Ireland*.




First edition. An early American work, intended as a general introduction to the subject. Includes chapters on Franklin's kite experiments and instructions for constructing an electrical kite. Second edition, first published the year before. Linn's pantheon of great minds through the ages ("See Johnson seated on his critic throne/ Genius with science and with judgement meet/ And form in him a character complete.", etc.), expansively notated with his own critical observations, providing a not uninteresting index of influence on a classically educated young American. He concludes with speculations on the future of American literature. Harris Index 1958; Wegelin 1037; Imprints 2543; Stoddard 711 "a new setting incorporating new texts."

First American edition and the first book on the subject published in America.

Sole edition. A feisty, factional attack on so-called "Moderates," calling for a return to "the pure principles of '76." Named in McNiece's jeremiad are Lemuel Clift, Joshua Purdy and James Owens. The most distinctive feature of this oration is the preface "To a Candid Public," worth quoting in full: "The following Oration is addressed for the following reasons. 1st. Lemuel Clift, Esq. has threatened 'that he will fine all the Irish pedlars, by God every Devil of them, for Mc.Niece's oration.' The pedlars may from reading judge for themselves, how I am to blame. 2nd. James Owens has expressed himself that I was a damned rascal, that he would kick my backside, for such a rascally oration, &c. &c. 3rd. That Americans may endeavor to discover who that party is, that I have dashed to Heaven and Hell. As Joshua Purdy, esq. has joined himself to this party; and has thus expressed himself, 'McNiece has raised US to heaven and dashed us to hell.' 4th. That if any in America thinks as I do, they may have an opportunity of flying from being the cause of fining pedlars, from getting their backsides kicked, from being shot, and from incurring displeasure of the party stiled US. N.B. I approve of fining pedlars, when it is done through a principle of Law and Justice; but should be sorry it should be done on my account." OCLC locates a single copy, with a mutilated title page, at AAS.



First edition. A printer's dummy? Numerous gatherings duplicated, bound out of order, and textually incomplete. The first treatise on moral philosophy written and published in America. Evans 28775.

First edition. Rev. Parsons' sermon outlines the requirements of righteous public officials and characterizes good government by way of Biblical authority. Parsons (1749-1823) lived in Amherst, and donated land for the college. Evans 21360.

18. (Songster.) *The Vocal Companion. Being a Choice Collection of the Most Approved Songs, Catches, Duets, &c.* Philadelphia: Printed for Mathew Carey, 1796. 12mo, orig. marbled boards, calf spine. Sadly lacking a leaf, otherwise a nice copy of a scarce and early songster, with words only of a mostly British-derived collection. The gap in pagination, with continuous running text, matches the AAS copy. Sonneck and Upton, p. 445; Lowens, 118. ESTC records copies at AAS (wanting frontis.), Brown, HSP and LOC.

First edition. Sullivan (1774-1839) is described by Appleton's as "a fine belle-lettres scholar and persuasive orator" and the present work is indeed rather more lively than the average 4th of July oration. He was a Boston Lawyer and ardent Federalist, and his speech is essentially a position paper in that mode, evoking the *Federalist Papers* - "said to have been the joint production of Jay, Madison and Hamilton. It is not easy to decide, whether this production is most estimable as an illustration of political truths, or as an acquision to literature." A choice copy. Imprints 5125.

First American edition, by Swedenborg's principal English disciple. Includes the *Dialogues*, a separately paged "Account of the Doctrines of the New Jerusalem Church...Extracted from Hurd's History of All Religions", and a catalogue of English translations of Swedenborg's works. A lovely, fresh copy. Evans 26774.

Pamphleteer Shippie Townsend (1722-1798,) now an obscure figure, was a self-educated tool and die maker and famous in his time as a doctrinal opponent of Samuel Mather, with whom he debated various issues in print. Included here are:

First edition. The Apocalypse is printed in parallel texts with Winthrop's interpretations, interestingly adapted for political exploitation., e.g. ""The first angel sounded, and there followed hail, and fire mingled with blood" is translated "And the first period was attended with heavy taxes, and persecution for the truth, which afflicted the subjects, chiefly of the east." Winthrop (1752-1821) was a jurist and Harvard librarian, with eccentric tendencies. "His chief literary efforts... were directed toward the interpretation of the Biblical prophecies, which led him to believe the European confederation of 1810 marked the beginning of a world union to be under the Guardian of the Law residing at Jerusalem." - DNB. First American edition. Cobbett wrote the preface to this American edition of Polwhele's satirical rant on Mary Wollstonecraft and her feminist circle, "who had thrown aside that modesty, which is the best characteristic and the most brilliant ornament of their sex, and who, with unblushing front, had adopted the sentiments and the manners of the impious amazons of republican France." Polwhele's footnotes far outweigh the text of the poem, with discursive asides on prominent women of the day. An appealing copy of a very scarce Cobbett imprint. Evans 38293; Gaines 126.
