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
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17th-20th Century Works Relating To Wines and Viticulture

A superior copy of this evocative survey of French wine, its production and consumption. The wood engraved illustrations show scenes in the vineyard, cellar and table setting, as well as regional character studies of the vintner, the harvester, cooper, sommelier, chef, restaurateur, etc., while the text provides corresponding, often humorous anecdotes. 

First edition thus, substantially revised, with a new preface. Gabler 21090.



5. LOUBAT, Alphonse. *The American Vine Dresser's Guide*. New York: G. & C. Carvil, 1829. 12mo, original printed boards. Pp. xv, [16]-142. Spine split vertically, chipped at extremities, front cover nearly detached; moderate soiling; very good. \$1,250.00



Second edition; first published in 1827. Loubat was a New York merchant, born in the south of France. He established a vineyard of 35 acres on what is now the Brooklyn waterfront, planted with his own imported French vinifera, vines that would ultimately succumb to American blackrot and mildew. But he enjoyed enough success to impress Nicholas Longworth, whose first Ohio vineyards were planted with vines supplied by Loubat. His book, with facing French and English text begins with a dedication "To the Shade of Franklin." It is based entirely on French practice, and covers all aspects of planting, cultivation, pruning and propagation and carries through briefly to wine making, casking and bottling. Loubat's work is the third treatise on the subject published in America, following close on those of Adlum and Dufour. A scarce work, this second edition particularly so. The printed boards, always desirable, are here particularly important, with the rear board taken up with Loubat's "Proposals for the Introduction of the Grape Vine into the United States, at a

moderate expense," describing his vineyards, mentioning that he is the sole agent of the Royal Nursery at Luxembourg, Paris; that his father is a nurseryman and grape grower in France; giving prices of large quantities of vines, and listing 10 agents for them in as many cities, from Boston to New Orleans. First edition. While heavily dependent on Redding, Henderson and others, this book "is probably the first consumer-oriented book on wine published. It describes the character and quality of major wines of the world from Portugal to Persia... It has chapters on the purchase, cellaring and appreciation of wines, as well as a tabular listing of all known wines, spirits and liquers." - Gabler 29420; Amerine & Borg 2272.

The author is identified on the title as being associated with The Nurseries, Chilwell, near Nottingham. The BLC lists no edition between this and the first of 1866. Gabler 32120 records the 3rd edition of 1873, and mentions eds. of 1885 and 1901, but not this.

9. POTOT de Missery. *Discours sur l'Excellence du Vin, Contes et Autre Anecdotes, faisant suite aux insomnies*. Dijon: Carion, 1829. 8vo, printed wrappers. Pp. 108. \$175.00

A bedside anthology of poetical tales which includes the title prose essay of 13 pp., on the virtues of wine as the source of poetry and music, a consolation to old age and melancholy, etc. The author concludes with the observation that "vous ne trouverez jamais un temps plus favorable pour approvissioner vos caveaux de ces bon vins de Nuits, de Beaune, de Volnay et de Meursault." The title identifies the author as a notary connected with the academy at Dijon. Scarce, not in Simon or Fritsch collection.

A popular guide which went through numerous editions, first published in 1855. Reemelin was a German immigrant who had a vineyard in Ohio. Gabler G34030; Amerine & Borg 2838.

First edition, one of a thousand copies, here in a handsome custom binding. An illustrated history one of the largest and most complex of the Cote de Nuits vineyards. Reissued later in 8vo and a modern reprint.


First edition. Detailed report of a congress of wine-makers of Bordeaux and neighboring regions, with reports on such economic issues as the place of vineyards in the general agricultural context, the potential financial support from land-banks, and protective tariffs for French wines. Not in NUC or OCLC.

A handsome edition of this culinary classic, nicely bound. Verdier was the proprietor of Maison Dorée, a famous restaurant of Belle-Epoch Paris. The book was a favorite of Elizabeth David, who frequently quoted from it. This copy has the bookplate of Robert Viel, noted restaurateur and cookery book collector.

First edition of the definitive work of its time, written to encourage a national cider industry to rival the wines of France. There are also brief chapters on winemaking from grapes and other fruits, and a catalogue of grape varieties, part of a long descriptive "Corollary of the Names and Natures of most Fruits growing in England."
